Despite this, I am proud to report that the College has still celebrated an overall 90% pass rate across all the Further Education courses through the 2019/20 academic year, while 1 in 6 undergraduate students gained First Class Honours degrees from our University Centre.

Unprecedented is the frequently used adjective to describe the turmoil caused by the Coronavirus. There has been no blueprint to follow. It has been hard for staff, students and their families alike. Welcome from the Principal and Chief Executive

As we reflect on the academic year 2019/2020, Blackburn College can be proud of how it has dealt with the challenges that COVID-19 has thrown our way.

The first national lockdown forced us to rethink our delivery strategy, moving all teaching online and adapting to staff's working from home processes.

Despite the remote working for staff and the remote learning for students, the College saw some incredibly inspiring initiative from staff and students during tough times. We celebrate our lockdown heroes on pages 18 to 21.

Even though 2020 was a demanding year for education in general, Blackburn College achieved outstanding results with an overall 91% Achievement Rate across all Further Education courses, a 100% Pass Rate in 21 A-Level Subjects and an overall 99.7% A-Level Pass Rate for the 2019/20 academic year; this included a 3.4% increase in A* grades and an 8.6% increase in A grades.

This success means that students have progressed to top Universities across the country such as Lancaster University, The University of Manchester and The University of Leeds.

After being rated 'Good' by Ofsted, our Apprenticeship provision continues to go from strength to strength.

Blackburn College is Top 10 in England when it comes to 16-18 year old Advanced Apprentice Success and the College is the Best in Pennine Lancashire when it comes to All Age Apprentice Success.

Meanwhile, over 95% of degree courses delivered at Blackburn University Centre continue to be validated by UK Top 10 Lancaster University. This year graduates have gained employment in a range of sectors including Construction, Mental Wellbeing, Business Advisory, Early Years and Childcare and Primary School Teaching.

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According to the 2020 National Student Survey (NSS), Blackburn University Centre has Lancashire's highest overall satisfaction increase and a higher student satisfaction than universities across the UK - ranking 3% above the national benchmark.

In 2021, Blackburn College will continue to play a critical role in enhancing the lives of thousands of students, our local community and a variety of businesses.

I hope you will enjoy reading about some of our successes from 2019/20.

About Blackburn College

Blackburn College is the largest Further Education College in Pennine Lancashire and one of the largest providers of Higher Education for a College in England. Since 1888, people from all over Lancashire and beyond have developed their skills, retrained and moved to higher levels of study with Blackburn College's support.

Blackburn College is at the heart of the multi-racial community of Blackburn with Darwen and aims to provide social cohesion in an area of high deprivation. The College works with a range of local partnerships to contribute to the wider prosperity and regeneration of Pennine Lancashire.

The majority of students and Apprentices are from the most economically deprived local areas. Around a third of students and Apprentices are of minority ethnic heritage and almost two thirds of Further Education students enrol at the College without having achieved five GCSEs at grades 9 - 4 (A* - C), including English and Mathematics.

Blackburn with Darwen is a 'Prevent' priority area and 14% of the local population have no qualifications. Millions of pounds have been invested in our world class, town centre campus which was developed collaboratively with employers and stakeholders to help future proof our curriculum and ensure our students are taught in industry-standard facilities. We have successfully fostered excellent relationships with local and regional partners and employers. This results in a curriculum that meets local and regional needs and provides high quality work experience for students and Apprentices.

We deliver specialist, bespoke training as well as Apprenticeships, Traineeships and Professional Qualifications, all of which equip the workforce with job relevant skills that match the current employment market.

Blackburn University Centre also provides Higher Education to students, including Foundation Degrees, Honours Degrees, Higher Level and Degree Level Apprenticeships. Our employer engagement supports employability through enhancements to curriculum development, mentoring placements, volunteering opportunities and industry specialist speakers. The College is a founder member of HIVE – the Blackburn with Darwen Business Leaders' Network. HIVE has already become an integral part of the area's Local Strategic Partnership, which brings together leading figures from the private, public and third sectors and is Blackburn and Darwen's largest partnership body.

The College has also been a key partner in the Blackburn Business Improvement District (BID) for the last five years, supporting many local improvements.

Ofsted Review of Lockdown Learning

From 30th September to 1st October 2020, Ofsted made an Interim Visit to Blackburn College. On 17th March 2020, Ofsted's routine inspections were suspended due to the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) pandemic.

As part of their phased return to routine inspections, they carried out 'Interim Visits' to Further Education and skills providers. Interim Visits were to help learners, parents, employers and Government understand how providers met the needs of learners and Apprentices in this period, including learners with high needs and those with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

Here's what Blackburn College implemented and the positive feedback we received for our COVID-19 response...

Clear Leadership

Early in the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) pandemic, Blackburn College Leadership Team set up a crisis steering group to support the continued delivery of the curriculum by moving learning online. They ensured that learners had access to computer equipment, learning resources and tutor support.

As soon as it was safe, managers arranged for learners on practical courses, such as Hairdressing and Construction, to return to College to complete training and assessments to prepare them for their next year of study. Blackburn College has made sure it is COVID compliant and adapted to the new normal by putting measures in place for the return to full face-to-face learning in September 2020.

What Ofsted said:



"Where necessary, leaders have adapted the curriculum to meet changing circumstances. For example, Health and Social Care learners on Cadet programmes who have not been able to access a work placement received virtual talks from ophthalmic and physiotherapy specialists, explaining what it is like to work in these sectors.

"Senior leaders worked with a range of stakeholders and partners, including the local authority, Jobcentre Plus, schools and employers to ensure that learners and Apprentices had frequent contact and support during the COVID-19 restrictions.

"Employers feel that their staff had been appropriately trained by College staff to be able to observe and video record Apprentices demonstrating their skills in the workplace. The local authority was very appreciative of the support it received from College leaders, particularly the Principal, to identify vulnerable learners in the Borough who needed additional support."

Adapting Existing Processes

Leaders and managers explained how they responded as soon as the COVID-19 restrictions were announced to adapt existing processes in order to ensure that they met, and continue to meet, the needs of learners and Apprentices. Leaders and managers carried out virtual and actual learning walks in their continued efforts to assure the quality of the curriculum.

What Ofsted said:

Revolutionising Safeguarding and **Student Health Support**

Given the limitations on face-to-face communication during the COVID-19 restrictions, staff have extended the use of the Safeguarding and Mental Health Hub and have ensured that learners know how to work safely online.

Staff know which learners need additional support from them and/ or external agencies. Teachers communicate with parents and carers to check the safety and wellbeing of vulnerable students.

What Ofsted said:

"Those learners and Apprentices who we spoke to said that they felt safe and know who to contact at the College if they have a concern for their safety. They all reported high levels of support from College staff. They say that they understand the importance of keeping themselves safe when working online.

"As part of their induction, new learners have received training on key Safeguarding themes. Leaders told us that where learners have disclosed Safeguarding issues, staff work with their previous school to offer them the right support."



"Adult learners on English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) courses received translated instructions to help them understand how to access online learning from home.

"Learners with high needs accessed learning online with the presence of learning support officers to help them. Key contact staff worked closely with parents of learners with high needs to ensure that they made progress towards their targets during the COVID-19 restrictions. Work was also sent home for those who struggled with online learning."

Lily was also a nursing Cadet and worked as a Sales Advisor in a local Superdrug store. The store was classed as essential as it includes a Pharmacy, so she worked more shifts than usual to help upkeep service.

In addition, Athena was a Cadet who worked on the checkouts at her local Tesco store and, again, worked extra to support the public's needs for necessities.

University Centre's Rachel Goes the Extra Mile During Coronavirus Pandemic

Blackburn University Centre student Rachel White went the extra mile during the Coronavirus pandemic.

Alongside her studies, Rachel, who is completing the BA (Hons) Contemporary Fashion course, used her skills to create free of charge face masks for family, friends, people with underlying health conditions and key workers

Working with equipment and materials from her home, she initially created face masks at the start of lockdown for family members who have underlying health conditions.

Rachel, from Blackburn, is also one of many people in the area who signed up as an NHS volunteer; helping to deliver shopping and prescriptions to vulnerable people.

Blackburn College Staff Create PPE for Key Care Workers

Blackburn College staff worked to support the national effort to stop the country's PPE shortages.

The College's Fashion and Textiles Technicians and Facilitators, Gwyneth Clarkson and Andrew Mathison, created scrub washbags and PPE button bands to help support key care workers.

The duo used the professional pattern cutting and sewing workshops at the Blackburn College campus, whilst adhering to social distancing guidelines.

Gwyneth and Andrew both received positive feedback! Molly, who is a nurse at Burnley General Hospital, said: "They're amazing! I love the button band that goes at the back of my head. Rachel said: "I was worried about members of my family, so I made them face masks from fabrics suited to them. I wasn't sure if anybody would wear them, but they love them and still wear them now - that made me smile.

"I know they aren't medical masks, but I didn't make them for that reason. I made them so that people who are worried about their health can have some comfort in these strange times."

Rachel added: "I then joined Facebook groups to learn how to create scrubs and masks for the NHS. I still wanted to help other key workers, so I contacted Wm. Alty & Sons Funeral Services, asked if they needed any face masks and explained that they weren't medical. They responded almost immediately and were so thankful.

"The headbands are also great. I've always found headbands slide backwards and end up nearly falling off, but the one that you clip behind your head is brilliant! I love my scrubs bag too, it's so convenient. Thank you very much."

Andrew said: "With the College's workshops and materials, it is the least we can do. Key workers are putting their health at risk on a daily basis whilst they continue their incredible work. We're just doing a small part in helping to ensure their safety."





"They ordered over 30 masks whilst waiting for a delayed order they had made from elsewhere. Their response was that they loved them and felt more confident at work. In every email, they offered to pay, but I said it wasn't about the money – it's about trying to keep people safe."

Outstanding Alumni Saima Ashraf Recognised as Community Champion

Blackburn College is proud that Alumni Saima Ashraf received the One Voice Outstanding Achievement Award at the recent 1V Community Champion Awards.

Saima, who was born in Blackburn and still lives in the town, currently works as a Senior Auditor at Merseyside Police – she is the only registered blind auditor in the UK and has kindly spoken about Blackburn College's support as part of her remarkable journey.

Saima began losing her sight when she was a child but continued her education, including her Accounting, **Business Studies and English** Language A-Levels at Blackburn College.

Today, alongside her work for Mersevside Police, she is also a governor at St Vincent's School for the Visually Impaired and hosts a radio me to learn, built my confidence show in Pendle, Lancashire which looks at health issues which are of concern to the Asian community. She has also committed her time to raising money for Blackburn and East Lancashire-based charities.

In light of her success, Saima still looks back on her time at Blackburn College with fondness: "When I was ready for starting college I was still coming to terms with losing my sight. I chose Blackburn College because I knew they had some of the best support networks in the North West.

"Without the College, I wouldn't be the same person and I wouldn't be where I am today. They encouraged and helped me overcome barriers to learning, particularly Ann Harwood, who went above and beyond to make sure lessons were suitable for blind students and that I didn't fall behind with any work.

"Sadly, Ann has since passed away, but she was a big influence on me and I can't thank her enough. The College even provided a support network for me when I left to go to University."

Blackburn College Supports Refugees with National Lottery Funding

Blackburn College supported refugees in the local community using National Lottery funding; helping them use cooking to build social networks, end isolation, improve their English and increase wellbeing.

'Friendship Feast' saw participants study for a Food Hygiene Certificate at Blackburn College, with each woman learning how to make cheap nutritious meals using locally available ingredients. Participants then created a menu inspired by their country of origin and worked together to cook the meal.

Moroccon-born participant Batoul Zahri described the moment the women sat to eat her dish as "the happiest moment" and explained "working together, chatting and getting to know each other is the part which really makes a difference in the project."

Participant Nabila Khavas – originally from Afghanistan – added: "Making friends and more confidence speaking in English" was a real gain for her.





College Art Student Tackles Mental Health Stigma Through His Work

Blackburn College Level 3 Art and Design student Lawrence Silcock is using his art to help bring an end to the stigma surrounding mental health.

Lawrence goes by his artist alias The Lone Artist – Lawlife Meledictus. He has autism and is portraying his experiences with mental health through impactful, graphic art.

Lawrence, who lives in Accrington, has also created commission-based art which was inspired by other people sharing their mental health experiences with him. Speaking at his art exhibition at Blackburn's Bureau Arts Centre, he said: "I chose Blackburn College after I moved house and was looking for a place of education to study. I have enjoyed absolutely everything about my course, the people I have met, the tutors, everything! "The tutors are great, they have helped me every step of the way and coming to the College has helped me become a better artist. The experience has encouraged me to plan going to University in the future."

Blackburn College Delighted to Launch Exciting WWII National Lottery Heritage Fund Project

May 2020 marked the 75th anniversary of VE Day and Blackburn University Centre was delighted to launch the World War II East Lancashire Childhoods: Sharing Stories, Making Memories project, thanks to a £15,000 grant from The National Lottery Heritage Fund.

The focus of the project was to give older residents and children of East Lancashire opportunities to talk about growing up during WWII, creating a digital archive preserving memories of childhood.

Residents of EACHSTEP care home, students and staff from the University Centre and pupils from Blackburn Children's University, supported by Blackburn Museum and Art Gallery and Blackburn Library, have all worked together to create an exciting programme of activities. The aim was to preserve the rich cultural histories from this period and to bring those experiences to life for a new generation. By inviting older residents to share their experiences we hope that children and younger people have developed a deeper awareness and understanding of what growing up during the war was like for the people who lived through it.

Project Leads Sandra Nichol and Dr Valerie Jessop said: "We have seen the enjoyment gained from the interaction between the children and older residents. Witnessing the conversations has been a joyful experience."



Sara Burton, Blackburn Children's University Manager, said: "The children have enjoyed visiting EACHSTEP and interacting with the older residents. This was a new experience for them and they have been able to talk with and learn from the residents, whilst doing many fun activities with them. It is something they will remember and being able to see these interactions has been wonderful."

Advancing Our Curriculum



College to Use AR/VR to Train the Future Textile Workforce

Blackburn College will use Augmented Reality (AR) and Virtual Reality (VR) in order to train the future textile workforce through the Tech for Textiles project.

The Tech for Textiles project will work in partnership with employers and learners to create AR and VR resources to support adult learners into employment within the textiles industry.

The VR resource will enable learners to experience a virtual factory environment, helping to dispel myths about the sector and the working environment.

The AR resources will enable learners to upskill in the basics of a sewing machine and particular stitch patterns, based on industry standard equipment any place any time using a tablet/ smart phone. The project responds to research from UKFT (Fashion & Textiles Sector Skills body) and includes the development of a lab space at the College. It has been funded by the Ufi VocTech Seed project with support from employers such as AMRC, Beagle Orthopaedics and Herbert Parkinson.

Tech for Textiles will support 30 learners with fast track skills for entry level job roles within the industry, as well as providing entry routes into the industry for under-represented groups. It aims to improve the image of the sector in the eyes of young people, in order to help compliment an ageing workforce, while adding value to employers through new expertise, techniques and technologies. Annie Kerfoot, Head of School (Creative and Digital) at Blackburn College, said: "Blackburn College is playing a key role in developing the VR and AR skills for students alongside their specific qualifications. In turn the students will need these skills as their future employers harness the commercial potential of these technologies.

"Companies are already embedding VR and AR into their business but they will need new skills as these technologies evolve. The lab we've developed is designed to address current skills gaps and is also flexible enough to be adapted to suit the future needs of this vitally important sector."

Blackburn College Launches New Dance Academy with Rossendale Dance and Drama Centre

Blackburn College has launched a new dance academy, The Mill, aimed at 16-18 year olds.

Working in partnership with Rossendale Dance and Drama Centre, The Mill is aimed at young people who are interested in performing, competing and choreographing dance – or studying these subjects at University.

Students can come to Blackburn College to learn in industry-standard studios and to access new classes covering a range of dance topics. Through work with Creative and Cultural Skills, Blackburn College has secured work experience and enrichment activities for students starting these courses with top West-End show, Wicked, and Music students having gone behind the scenes on a production day with The 1975. Head of School (Creative and Digital), Annie Kerfoot, said: "We created The Mill as we wanted to get more young people into dance and inspire the next generation of talented performers, whilst also providing a progression route to Universities.

"Blackburn College already had a range of top class facilities ideal for this provision including ballet and dance studio and performance lab as part of Blackburn Sports and Leisure Centre and a TV and screening area as part of our Futures Centre.

"Future generations will now be able to harness these top-end facilities, coupled with tuition from Rossendale Dance and Drama Centre."

Students studying the programme will gain a University of the Arts London (UAL) Diploma or Extended Diploma in Performing and Production Arts.



The courses are designed to provide students with the knowledge, skills and understanding necessary to access and progress to degree level study or employment in the performing arts.

They provide an opportunity for those who have an interest in the performing arts to explore, develop and test their creativity within a qualification structure which is stimulating, demanding and provides a supportive transition from GCSE level to more specialised study on an A-Levelequivalent course.

Looking Ahead to 2021

Plans for Redeveloped Blackburn Sixth Form

A newly, redeveloped Sixth Form is due to open in Blackburn in September 2021.

The unveiled A-Level study centre will form part of Blackburn College but will see the redevelopment project and an extension added to a building that opened in 2007 – and the creation of Blackburn Sixth Form.

Blackburn Sixth Form will be an environment with a uniquely academic Dr Fazal Dad. Principal and Chief ethos, however, there will also be new enrichment activities, an enhanced tutorial model, work experience weeks linking in with major employers and support for parents.

The announcement follows a successful year of A-Level recruitment and significant increases in A-Level grades achieved in 2019/20.

Alongside the launch of Blackburn Sixth Form will be the launch of three new professional pathways of study - Law, Business and Science which will allow students to combine A-Levels and an industry-relevant qualification.

Executive at Blackburn College, said: "This is an exciting redevelopment that will transform A-Level and Academic Studies in Blackburn and give A-Level students a truly dedicated, academic Sixth Form study experience.

"The expansion of our A-Level delivery with the introduction of new A-Level subjects including Music and the new A-Level pathways highlight our determination to be a Further Education leader in Lancashire for A-Levels.

"The College is investing in providing the best possible education resources for future students. There will be a large-scale building project that will see the creation of new study spaces resulting in a new, impressive Sixth Form for Blackburn.
